56. Approval of the October 2025 Board Meeting Minutes

The Rotary International Board of Directors convened 13-15 October 2025 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, USA, and recorded 41 decisions and reviewed 12 committee reports. The general secretary distributed the meeting minutes to the directors and posted them to Rotary.org.

DECISION: The Board approves the October 2025 Board meeting minutes as distributed.

57. Ratification of Decisions Made by the President

Rotary Code of Policies section 27.040. provides for instances when the president may act on the Board’s behalf, including to fill vacancies in the office of governor or governor-elect and to approve waivers for the qualifications for serving as governor. District 9999 (New Zealand) requested a waiver of the seven-year membership requirement for serving as district governor, as the district’s governor-nominating committee reported that the candidate it had selected was the individual who was otherwise best qualified to serve. President Arezzo consulted with Director Scott on this governor-nominee waiver.

DECISION: The Board ratifies President Arezzo’s decision to excuse April Eden of the Rotary Club of Dunedin Central, New Zealand, from the seven-year membership qualification of a governor-nominee.

58. Ratification of Decisions Made by the General Secretary

The Board has authorized the general secretary to take decisions on its behalf on such topics as admitting clubs into RI, amending club constitutions, excusing clubs from indebtedness, approving club incorporations and name changes, merging clubs, modifying district boundaries, canceling club charters, terminating club memberships, approving Rotaract club changes, and terminating Rotary Fellowships.

DECISION: The Board ratifies the decisions shown in Appendix A made by the general secretary on the Board’s behalf during the period 1 September through 30 November 2025.

59. General Secretary’s Report

To supplement his written report, the general secretary updated the Board on the work at the Secretariat since the October 2025 Board meeting, including current membership initiatives and concerns, partnerships with other organizations, the status of polio eradication efforts, a recent reorganization in the Secretariat’s Member and Participant Experience division, Taipei convention registration and program updates, the use of artificial intelligence at the Secretariat, and other recent major technology updates.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary’s report on the activities at the Secretariat since the October 2025 Board meeting.

60. Treasurer’s Report

The Rotary Code of Policies provides that the treasurer report on the status of RI finances at least once a quarter. Treasurer Eakes reported on the year-to-date status of RI expenses and revenues compared to budget, Taipei convention registration numbers and projections, and net investment earnings, among other financial matters.

DECISION: The Board thanks Treasurer Eakes for his report on the status of RI finances.

61. Communications From the Trustees

Trustee liaison to the Board Ann-Britt Åsebol summarized several decisions from the October Trustees meeting of interest to the Board.

DECISION: The Board notes the following decisions from the 10-11 January 2026 Trustees meeting:

- 38. 2026-27 Committee Appointments
- 45-49. International PolioPlus Committee Report
- 55. Ashoka Service Partnership

62. Updates to the Rotary Code of Policies

The general secretary reviews decisions taken at each Board meeting and prepares a report listing those decisions that should be added to the Rotary Code of Policies. The Board reviewed suggested amendments to the code based upon Board decisions taken at the October 2025 meeting and further recommended amendments to the code to reflect current practices, language, and other factors.

DECISION: The Board amends the Rotary Code of Policies as shown in Appendix B.

63. 2026-27 Committee Appointments

The Rotary Code of Policies provides for the structure and composition of all Rotary committees. RI Bylaws section 17.040. provides that the president shall appoint the members of the committees after consulting the Board. Code section 31.040.4. provides that such appointments be annually reviewed and approved by the Board. Accordingly, President-elect Babalola presented his committee appointments for the Board's consideration at this meeting. In addition, he recommended changes to improve collaboration and reduce duplication in certain areas, including restructuring technical adviser roles and modifying membership composition on the Joint Strategic Planning Committee.

DECISION: The Board:

1. agrees with the president-elect's proposal to modify the membership composition of the Joint Strategic Planning Committee and amends the Rotary Code of Policies as follows:

31.088. Joint Strategic Planning Committee
Purpose: Advises the Board and Trustees on matters regarding the strategic plan for the organizations.
Composition: 8 to 9 members, with at least one member being a Rotaractor at the time of appointment, with 2-3 members appointed jointly annually by the RI President and the Trustee Chair in consultation with the RI President-elect and the Trustee Chair-elect. The Chair and Vice Chair appointed by the RI President and the Trustee Chair in consultation with the RI President-elect and the Trustee Chair-elect.

2. approves the president-elect's recommendations for the 2026-27 RI committees and joint committees with The Rotary Foundation, as shown in Appendix C filed only with the official copy of these minutes, and requests the president-elect to invite the listed persons to serve in their respective roles;
3. approves by a two-thirds vote the appointment of advisers as listed in Appendix C.

DECISIONS 64-71

2025 Council on Resolutions Requests

The 2025 Council on Resolutions met virtually from 15 October through 31 October and adopted eight resolutions requesting Board action.

64. Participation in District Committees

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from the Rotary Club of Koshien, Hyogo, Japan, to have district governors encourage members with less than five years of Rotary membership to participate in district committees. The Board noted that internal data indicates a significant attrition rate within the first year of membership, and a substantial portion of terminations occur within the first three years. The Board agreed that such steps could broaden newer members' understanding and appreciation of Rotary's mission and activities.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and the Rotary Club of Koshien, Hyogo, Japan, for the proposal in Resolution 25R-01;
2. noting that 10% of new members leave in their first year of membership and that 50% of all member terminations are by members with less than three years in Rotary, agrees with the proposal;
3. encourages district governors-elect to consider newer members with pertinent qualifications for service on district committees.

65. Encouraging Rotaract Clubs to Establish an Upper Age Limit for Membership

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from District 7815 (Canada, Saint Pierre and Miquelon) requesting the Board to consider encouraging Rotaract clubs to establish an upper age limit of 30 to join Rotaract. The Board noted that this proposal has been brought for consideration multiple times and that the Board has consistently agreed that a Rotaract club's autonomy in promoting its club and managing its membership results in a stronger club experience. The general secretary further noted that internal data does not support the proposition that setting a Rotaract club upper age limit would result in greater conversion rates to full Rotary club membership.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and District 7815 (Canada, Saint Pierre and Miquelon) for the proposal in Resolution 25R-02;
2. notes that Rotaract clubs may already set age limits that align best with the club's individual growth and engagement goals, however agrees to consider the concerns expressed in this resolution as part of a larger review of Rotaract beginning in this Rotary year.

66. To Appoint a Committee of Zone 8 Representatives to Provide Regionalization Pilot Input

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from District 9920 (American Samoa, Cook Islands, Fiji, French Polynesia, Kiribati, New Zealand, Tonga, Samoa) requesting the Board to appoint a committee comprising representatives of Zone 8 districts to provide input on the current regionalization pilot. The Board discussed how the pilot has been developed and managed by members from the zone and how the pilot's oversight has been conducted by a steering committee and local regional council, with opportunities for local Rotarian involvement. The general secretary reported on efforts to ensure balanced representation of the island nations, noting that the Zone 8 Steering Committee includes past district governors who served in various years and holds regular meetings with current governors, governors-elect, and governors-nominee.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and District 9920 for the proposal in Resolution 25R-09;
2. noting that the pilot was developed by and is managed by Rotarians in Zone 8 who represent the districts in Zone 8, does not agree to implement this proposal.

67. Proposal to Reestablish the Annual Presidential Theme

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from the Rotary Club of Curitiba-Leste, Paraná, Brazil, to consider reestablishing the annual presidential theme. The Board noted its recent decisions regarding Rotary branding strategies to establish a unified approach to organization-wide messaging aligned with Rotary's Action Plan and focused on key Rotary International priorities. The Board expressed its concern that separate, annual presidential themes risk diluting Rotary's overall messaging and require significant organizational costs—both financial and administrative—to properly implement.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and the Rotary Club of Curitiba-Leste, Paraná, Brazil, for the proposal in Resolution 25R-14;
2. noting that RI presidents continue to have an annual message and focus for their year in office, and that these messages are approved by the Board and aligned with Rotary's Action Plan, providing continuity and strong brand cohesion; and further noting that continually changing annual themes and logos have diluted Rotary's brand—especially with external audiences—and require significant costs to implement, does not agree to this proposal.

68. Encouraging Clubs to Hold an Annual Meeting Focused on the Council on Legislation

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from District 1790 (France) to encourage clubs to hold an official annual meeting focused on the Council on Legislation. The Board discussed how such an annual meeting could help promote increased participation in Rotary's legislative process, strengthen the connection between individual clubs and the creation of the organization's policies, and close any knowledge gaps members may have regarding Rotary's triennial legislation meeting.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and District 1790 (France) for the proposal in Resolution 25R-19;
2. noting that all strategies to educate and engage our members may lead to improved membership retention in Rotary, agrees with the proposal and therefore encourages all clubs to convene an annual meeting focused on the Council on Legislation.

69. Enhanced Public Image Training

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from the Rotary Club of Ulhasnagar, Maharashtra, India, requesting the development and promotion of enhanced public image training programs at the district level. The Board noted that Rotary International currently provides extensive, adaptable public image training through seminars, self-paced learning plans, Brand Center guidance, targeted communications, and convention sessions that are supported by Rotary public image coordinators and Secretariat staff.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and the Rotary Club of Ulhasnagar, Maharashtra, India, for the proposal in Resolution 25R-22;
2. noting that Rotary produces public image-related curricula, courses, and resources that can be used at the district level, does not agree to develop new public image training programs as recommended in the proposal;
3. encourages Rotary public image coordinators to help district learning committees and district public image committees to work with club public image committees to ensure that they know about the resources available and how to use them locally.

70. Governors-nominee Learning Seminar and RI's Governance Documents

The Council on Resolutions agreed to a proposal from District 3640 (Korea) to allocate time within the governors-nominee learning seminar on the subject of RI's governance documents. The Board discussed how district governors-nominee must complete three learning plans through the Rotary Learning Center and attend three required seminars, and further noted that Rotary's governance documents, policies, and best practices inform the course development. The general secretary reported that the learning plans are subject to regular reviews and updates, and that a future update can determine the most appropriate point to introduce governors-nominee to RI's governance documents.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and District 3640 (Korea) for the proposal in Resolution 25R-21;
2. concurs that governors-nominee should be familiar with RI's governance documents and requests the general secretary to assess the best time and format to introduce governors-nominee to RI's governance documents;
3. acknowledges that the convener of each governors-nominee learning seminar can include topics that are relevant to that seminar's governors-nominee.

71. Resolutions Concerning The Rotary Foundation

The Council on Resolutions agreed to two proposals from the Rotary Club of Wonju, Korea, requesting The Rotary Foundation Trustees to provide the amount of available investment income derived from contributions to the Endowment-SHARE, and to confer Paul Harris Society membership to those who donate to the Endowment.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the 2025 Council on Resolutions and the Rotary Club of Wonju, Korea, for the proposals concerning The Rotary Foundation;
2. refers these proposals to the Trustees for consideration.

72. Election Review Committee Report

The Election Review Committee reviewed three election complaints received by the general secretary since the October 2025 Board meeting and submitted its recommendations regarding these complaints to the Board. Key issues included allegations of improper campaigning, misuse of district resources, and disputes over election guidelines. The committee emphasized the importance of resolving conflicts through proper Rotary channels and adhering to the organization's principles and code of conduct.

DECISION: The Board:

1. receives the complaints of the Rotary Clubs of Sto. Domingo and West Triangle, Quezon City, Philippines, concerning the election of the 2027-28 governor of District 3780 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the Rotary clubs' complaints fail to provide compelling evidence of election violations by Governor-nominee Maria Lourdes G. Alvarez or District Governor Domilo Domingo Lucenario;
 - b. finds that the criminal case filed against members of the West Triangle Rotary Club on behalf of Governor-nominee Alvarez does not constitute a violation of RI Bylaws section 13.030.5., but notes that Rotary has expectations for all members' behavior in The Four-Way Test and Member Code of Conduct, and therefore

strongly urges the parties in the district to resolve any legal disputes and reserves the right to take future action if these matters are not resolved;

2. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Cavite Export Processing Zone, Philippines, concerning the election of the 2026-27 governor of District 3810 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. finds that the complaint and supporting documents fail to substantiate its claims of electioneering or canvassing by Governor-nominee Maria Rosa Nieva Carrion;
 - b. believes that the district did not have any valid grounds to investigate Governor-nominee Carrion's role in another organization and notes there is no requirement that a candidate identify other organizations they may be affiliated with;
 - c. dismisses the complaint of the Rotary Club of Cavite Export Processing Zone and confirms the selection of Rotarian Carrion as the 2026-27 governor of District 3810;
3. receives the complaint of the Rotary Club of Franca, São Paulo, Brazil, concerning the election of the 2027-28 governor of District 4540 and based on the report of the Election Review Committee:
 - a. agrees that the complaint was duly filed in accordance with the RI Bylaws and is properly before the Board at this time;
 - b. finds that the complaint fails to substantiate its allegations against Governor-nominee Alexandre Faccin;
 - c. notes the evidence of ongoing conflict between factions within the district and requests Director Scherer to discuss possible conflict management steps with the district leadership;
 - d. dismisses the complaint of Rotary Club of Franca and confirms the selection of Rotarian Faccin as the 2027-28 governor of District 4540.

73. Joint Technology Committee Report

The Joint Technology Committee met 17-18 November 2025 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, USA, to discuss strategic technology initiatives for Rotary. The committee reaffirmed its advisory role, focusing on a multiyear technology road map aimed at enhancing Rotary's service and member experience. Key discussions centered on principles for technology adoption, data management strategies, and vendor partnerships. The committee further endorsed the integration of artificial intelligence into Rotary's digital tools and approved a three-year strategic road map.

The committee reported that to strengthen data governance, an internal council was established to enforce standards and improve data completeness. The committee further reported exploring artificial intelligence applications for near-future implementation, including chatbots and language translation tools. Ongoing projects include improvements to the Service Project Center and a transition of the Grant Center to a new platform. The committee emphasized the importance of simplifying the technology portfolio and allocating resources toward innovation.

Other updates included enhancements to club and district management tools aimed at streamlining processes and reducing errors; introduction of the Learning Center mobile app; expansion of online giving platforms with new features to enhance the user experience; and improvements to the My Rotary sign-in and registration processes, including the implementation of self-service options and advanced authentication methods. A new system for managing prospective members is scheduled for implementation in the first quarter of 2026.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Joint Technology Committee for its report.

74. Joint Strategic Planning Committee Report

The Joint Strategic Planning Committee met virtually on 5 November 2025 to discuss organizational updates and initiatives. The committee reviewed the strategic road map, including new initiatives for 2025-26; recently launched strategic initiatives focusing on participant events and revenue strategy; status updates on the Evidence-Based Decision-Making strategic initiative and the Club Experience strategic initiative; and a report on revision of the Presidents-elect Learning Seminar curriculum. The committee further reported on Action Plan champions' activities, which included promoting organizational tools and developing partnerships.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Joint Strategic Planning Committee for its report.

75. Joint Learning Committee Report

The Joint Learning Committee met 6-7 November 2025 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, USA, to discuss Rotary's strategic shift from training to learning; potential enhancements to the learning experience for various Rotary roles; an analysis of conflict resolution skills for key Rotary officers; efforts to promote the roles of assistant governors; initiatives to track and increase Learning Center course completions; and preparations of district Rotaract representatives in assuming their roles. The committee further discussed the importance of enhancing Learning Center course inter-activity, automating messages, and conducting studies to correlate Learning Center usage with positive club outcomes.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Joint Learning Committee for its report.

76. Zone Realignment Steering Committee Report

RI Bylaws section 11.010.3. provides that the Board “shall undertake, no less often than every eight years, a comprehensive review of the composition of the zones.” In a special August 2025 meeting, the Board approved the creation of three regional workgroups to develop rezoning proposals for review at this meeting. These workgroups (representing the Americas, Europe and Africa, and Asia and Oceania) met between September and December 2025 to develop the rezoning proposals for their respective regions. The Board reviewed this restructure, including which districts should be in each zone, and further reviewed implementation schedules under this new zone structure for the nominating committees for RI president and director and Rotary institutes.

DECISION: The Board:

1. in accordance with RI Bylaws section 11.010.3., requiring the Board to review the composition of zones at least every eight years, agrees to realign the 34 zones as shown in Appendix D;
2. establishes the implementation schedule for changeover to the new zone structure as shown in Appendix D;
3. requests the Zone Realignment Steering Committee to consider other issues associated with a revised zone structure and its implementation, such as sectioning, zone pairing, and director election rotation, for report to the Board at its April 2026 meeting;
4. requests the Trustee chair to appoint a liaison trustee to work with the Zone Realignment Steering Committee on the items listed in point 3 above.

77. RI Programs Committee Report

The RI Programs Committee met virtually on 22 November 2025 to discuss various initiatives and program updates. The committee formed working groups to support youth engagement and to promote Rotary programs. Working group reports indicated positive trends in several areas, including Rotary Youth Exchange, which showed recovery following the COVID-19 pandemic with increased student participation. The committee reported that the Rotary Community Corps program has demonstrated significant impact, with a high percentage of leaders reporting skill development, and has expanded its presence across numerous countries. The committee also reported that Rotary Fellowships experienced substantial engagement, offering networking and educational opportunities to participants, recognizing new groups, and maintaining strong participation.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Programs Committee for its report.

78. Service Awards

The Service Above Self Award is one of the highest Rotary honors. The Board annually awards up to 150 recipients for outstanding humanitarian service. The Board also annually recognizes one outstanding Rotary alumnus or alumna with the Rotary Alumni Global Service Award and one exemplary alumni association with the Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award. The RI Service Awards Selection Committee reviewed nominations for these awards and submitted its recommendations to the Board.

DECISION: The Board:

1. approves the 132 recipients of the 2025-26 RI Service Above Self Award, as shown in Appendix E, filed only with the official copy of these minutes;
2. confirms that the selection results for the Service Above Self Award shall be kept confidential until the presentations of the awards have been made;
3. selects the individuals as shown in Appendix E (filed only with the official copy of these minutes) as the principal recipient and alternate recipient of the 2025-26 Rotary Alumni Global Service Award;
4. selects the alumni association as shown in Appendix E (filed only with the official copy of these minutes) as the recipient of the 2025-26 Rotary Alumni Association of the Year Award;
5. requests the general secretary to notify the alumni award recipients and confirm their commitment to receive the awards.

79. Ashoka Service Partnership

Rotary’s service partnership with Ashoka began in 2017 and was subsequently extended through multiple renewals, with the current agreement set to expire in February 2027. The partnership aimed to enhance Rotary’s humanitarian impact by connecting members with Ashoka’s global network of social entrepreneurs for learning, collaboration, and project

development across Rotary's areas of focus. The general secretary reported that in 2025, Ashoka shifted its partnership strategy to prioritize revenue-generating relationships, thus reducing its capacity to implement activities with Rotary. As a result, the general secretary suggested terminating the partnership, while noting that Rotary members may still independently engage with Ashoka and seek partnership support through Rotary's existing channels.

DECISION: The Board:

1. extends its appreciation to Ashoka for nine years of collaboration;
2. terminates Rotary's service partnership with Ashoka, effective 1 February 2026;
3. encourages clubs and districts to collaborate with Ashoka Fellows to help drive community change through innovative, entrepreneurial approaches.

80. Rotary Fellowships Annual Report

The general secretary presented the 2025 Rotary Fellowships Annual Report, highlighting a thriving global network of fellowships engaging members across numerous countries. These groups unite Rotarians, Rotaractors, and non-members around shared interests, with Rotarians composing the majority of participants. Fellowships offered various activities, including recreational pursuits, professional development opportunities, and service projects. Membership spanned a wide range of professions and interests, from IT professionals and lawyers to golfers and yachters. The program supported Rotary's strategic priorities by enhancing engagement, expanding reach, and increasing adaptability. In 2024-25 there were 120 Rotary Fellowships comprising more than 81,000 members in over 150 countries.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's 2025 Rotary Fellowships Annual Report.

81. Rotary Community Corps Annual Report

The general secretary presented the 2025 Rotary Community Corps (RCC) Annual Report, highlighting three program goals: (1) to develop partnerships between Rotary members and non-members to enhance local communities, (2) to support community members who proactively address community needs, and (3) to promote sustainable solutions to community needs by engaging a broader segment of the community in developing and implementing service projects. As of 2025, there are 14,235 RCCs, sponsored by 4,465 Rotary clubs in 103 countries, with higher participation in regions such as South Asia, Africa, and the Middle East. RCCs support various Rotary areas of focus, with an emphasis on community development, disease prevention, and education.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's 2025 Rotary Community Corps Annual Report.

82. Youth Advisory Council Report

The Youth Advisory Council met virtually 8-9 November 2025 to discuss defining youth-related terms in a Rotary context. The council sought clarification on definitions related to different age groups. Working groups addressed key areas such as communications, alumni engagement, and youth culture and collaboration. The council identified cultural differences as barriers to youth participation in Rotary and recommended that districts and zones create local youth councils and involve young leaders in local roles. The council further reviewed the Programs for Young Leaders contact role and provided input on the upcoming Youth Exchange Officers Preconvention program. Discussions included strategies to advance programmatic knowledge and participation in youth programs and developing opportunities for youth advisers to provide guidance to zones and Rotary International directors.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the Youth Advisory Council for its report;
2. to help support inclusive Rotary club, district, and zone environments, requests the general secretary, in collaboration with the Joint Enhancing Participant Engagement Committee and RI Programs Committee, to define (in a Rotary context) the terms *children*, *youth*, *young leaders*, and *young adults*;
3. requests the RI Programs Committee to partner with the Youth Advisory Council to explore opportunities for youth and young adult advisers to provide input and perspective to zone leadership teams on matters pertaining to youth service, Rotary's Programs for Young Leaders, youth engagement, and alumni engagement, for report to the April 2026 Board meeting.

83. 2029 and 2031 Rotary International Convention Site Selections

In decision 104, February 2025, the Board requested the general secretary to inspect Barcelona, Spain; Cairo, Egypt; Dublin, Ireland; and New Delhi, India, as possible sites for the 2029 and 2031 Rotary International Conventions. A site inspection team conducted thorough evaluations and provided the Board with data on how each city compares to the Board's critical criteria for hosting a Rotary International Convention, including an analysis of the convention venue

space, housing availability, financial incentives, venue rental costs, surrounding infrastructure, banking and tax considerations, and safety and security concerns. The site selection team concluded that two of these cities had met these criteria sufficiently to hold a successful Rotary International Convention.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the Rotary International Convention site selection team for their report;
2. tentatively selects Barcelona, Spain, to host the 2029 Rotary Convention 2-6 June, using Fira Barcelona Gran Via as the primary venue, subject to the general secretary's successful negotiation of an appropriate block of hotel rooms, adequate space in which to hold all convention activities, a transportation agreement, thorough review of related tax implications, and any other agreements necessary to memorialize the proposal from the host area, and requests the general secretary to provide a status report at the October 2026 Board meeting;
3. tentatively selects Dublin, Ireland, to host the 2031 Rotary Convention 7-11 June, using the Royal Dublin Society as the primary venue, subject to the general secretary's successful negotiation of an appropriate block of hotel rooms, adequate space in which to hold all convention activities, a transportation agreement, thorough review of related tax implications, and any other agreements necessary to memorialize the proposal from the host area, and requests the general secretary to provide a status report at the October 2027 Board meeting;
4. requests the general secretary to notify all bid teams of the results of this Board decision.

84. 2027 International Convention Committee Report

The 2027 International Convention Committee met in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, 17-19 November 2025 for advance planning for the 2027 Rotary International Convention, scheduled for 22-26 May 2027. The committee confirmed that the Dubai World Trade Centre meets critical criteria to host a Rotary International Convention. The committee reported that while financial incentives currently offset a significant portion of venue costs, it is still recommending access to convention reserves to support a conservative, break-even budget. The committee reviewed industry trends, evaluations from recent conventions, and regulatory requirements in Dubai, including permitting and data-sharing obligations that will affect programming and member-led events. A guiding framework focusing on storytelling, emotional engagement, and inspiring impact was adopted to shape general sessions, breakout sessions, and the House of Friendship. Program discussions included revised approaches to youth and Rotaract engagement, provisional approval of a business forum, donor events, signature events, and ticketed luncheons. The committee also reviewed marketing, transportation, housing, registration, sponsorship, and Host Organization Committee plans. To provide district governors-elect with the latest information on the convention, the Board held a special virtual meeting on 5 January 2026 to consider the Convention Committee's report.

DECISION: The Board:

1. accepts the preliminary program of events and activities for the 2027 Rotary International Convention in Dubai, as shown in Appendix F, filed only with the official copy of these minutes, and authorizes the president-elect, convention chair, and general secretary to continue to develop the program with regular reports to the Board;
2. agrees, in accordance with its decision 47, October 2024, to explore alternate networking and learning opportunities for current and prospective Youth Exchange program leaders, participants, and alumni during the official dates of the convention in place of a separate Youth Exchange Officers pre-convention event, and approves an exception to the Rotary Code of Policies regarding a Youth Exchange Officers pre-convention event (section 57.110.3.2.) for this purpose;
3. approves an exception to the Rotary Code of Policies regarding Rotary Fellowships (section 42.010.10.) and Rotary Action Groups (section 42.020.12.) to provide meeting rooms for Global Networking Groups' annual general meetings for those that comply fully with the local permitting requirements for the 2027 Rotary Convention (in addition to satisfying the qualifications stated in the policy);
4. approves an exception to the Rotary Code of Policies regarding budget thresholds for conventions (section 57.100.1.) to approve a budgeted attendance of 17,000 for the 2027 convention for the purposes of providing a break-even budget as required by the RI Bylaws, and approves a marketing goal of 20,270 participants;
5. approves the Dubai Host Organization Committee's preliminary budget and plans to donate any surplus funds to a mutually identified beneficiary organization;
6. requests the general secretary, in consultation with the convention chair and president-elect, to further develop the 2027 Dubai convention budget in accordance with discussion at this meeting;
7. approves the proposal from District 2452 and confirms Dubai as the host city of the Rotary International Convention, 22-26 May 2027, using the Dubai World Trade Centre as the primary venue.

85. Creation of Local Entity in Dubai to Support 2027 Rotary International Convention

The general secretary recommended that the Board authorize the establishment of a legal entity in Dubai to support the 2027 Rotary International Convention. The entity, recommended to be a limited liability company, is required under local law for essential planning activities. The legal entity will enable critical activities such as executing venue contracts, integrating registration systems, opening a local bank account, and acquiring necessary permits.

DECISION: The Board:

1. authorizes the establishment of a local legal entity in Dubai to support the operational and financial activities of the 2027 Rotary International Convention, in compliance with local regulation requirements;
2. requests the general secretary to take all steps necessary to establish and operate the entity.

86. Membership Report

Board policy provides time at each Board meeting for a discussion on membership. The Board discussed various aspects of the organization's efforts to significantly grow its membership to 1.25 million members by 2030, including regional marketing strategies, a new system for managing potential member leads, strategies for engaging current and prospective members, a new member engagement email campaign, and new webinars for welcoming new members into Rotary. The general secretary further reported on a reorganization of the Secretariat's staff dedicated to membership matters.

DECISION: The Board receives the general secretary's report on activities and investments currently underway to support membership growth and engagement.

87. 1.25 Million by 2030 Regional Membership Summits

To support Rotary's goal of reaching 1.25 million members by 2030, President-elect Babalola and President-nominee Lunsford proposed holding regional membership visioning events for Rotary membership coordinators and Rotary public image coordinators. The proposal recommended up to nine regional, 1½-day events using a modular, locally adapted curriculum focused on membership growth, new club formation, and retention, with an expected outcome of each regional leader developing a detailed, actionable plan aligned with regional membership strategies to help achieve the 2030 membership goal.

DECISION: The Board:

1. requests the general secretary to organize and conduct up to nine supplemental regional visioning events for first- and second-year Rotary membership coordinators and Rotary public image coordinators and the appropriate staff membership growth and club experience officers during the first quarter of Rotary year 2026-27;
2. authorizes President-elect Babalola to determine specific visioning locations and the Board and Membership Growth Committee representatives to attend each regional event;
3. includes US\$150,000 in the 2026-27 budget for this purpose.

88. Annual Statement and Report of District Finances Policy Update

The general secretary recommended policy revisions to clarify expectations concerning a district's standard financial recordkeeping and to safeguard against the misuse of policy for punitive or coercive purposes. Under the new policy, past district governors who have not duly submitted their annual financial statement are ineligible to serve in district appointments for seven years. Accountability would extend to current governors who block clubs from reviewing and voting on a past governor's financial report. Those governors would be subject to the same prohibitions as the immediate past governor. Additional safeguards clarify that an individual who fails to report financials is ineligible to serve as district financial stewardship subcommittee chair or as RI director.

DECISION: The Board amends its policies regarding a governor's failure to report on finances as shown in Appendix G.

89. Zone 8 Regionalization Pilot Update

In decision 129, April 2023, the Board agreed to fund the Zone 8 regionalization pilot through 2023-24, and in principle through 2026, subject to the Board's annual review. After hearing the Board's recent concerns about the status of the zone's regionalization plans, the Zone 8 Regionalization Steering Group presented a new direction for the regionalization pilot to the Board at its June 2025 meeting, focusing on key performance indicators, strategic priorities, and post-pilot transition plans. The steering group presented on the status of the zone's newly refined regionalization efforts and, noting the significant fundamental changes their plan aims to make, requested a two-year extension of pilot operations and additional funding from Rotary.

DECISION: The Board:

1. agrees to extend the Zone 8 regionalization pilot through 2027-28;

2. directs the districts in Zone 8 to pause elections for the 2028-29 district governor to allow Director Scott to convene a working group that will propose new districts starting 1 July 2028;
3. by a three-quarters vote, approves US\$149,941 from RI reserves to fund dedicated pilot staffing in Australia for 2026-27;
4. agrees to reallocate a portion of the district funding in fiscal year 2026-27 to the Zone 8 Regional Council in the amount of US\$176,823.

90. Rotary in the Philippines

The Rotary districts in the Philippines have faced longstanding dysfunction marked by internal conflicts, governance problems, and a high volume of election complaints. Although the introduction of mandatory electronic voting in 2020 reduced procedural issues, overall complaints have continued to increase. The general secretary reported that this ongoing conflict has placed a heavy burden on Rotary leadership, harmed the organization's public image, and discouraged member engagement and leadership development in the region. To address these systemic issues, Director Scott proposed a coordinated, nationwide approach, including setting clear expectations for reform, routing all complaints through a Philippines oversight commission, and potentially terminating the membership of particularly disruptive individuals, with the aim of restoring stability, accountability, and confidence in Rotary across the Philippines.

DECISION: The Board, noting that club, district, and regional leaders in the Philippines for many years have failed to address and resolve personal and factional-related conflicts, policy violations, other misconduct, and election disputes, which damage Rotary's public image and do not align with Rotary's core values, takes the following steps to address this persistent dysfunction:

1. requests the president to appoint a special presidential adviser to meet with senior leaders in the Philippines to assess the extent of the conflict and the individuals, clubs, and districts involved, for report to the president before the Board's April 2026 meeting;
2. approves a 2025-26 budget variance of US\$10,000 for the special adviser's expenses;
3. establishes the President's Philippines Council (PPC) to receive and judge all allegations of misconduct, personal and factional-related conflicts, policy violations, and other disputes (except for matters related to Foundation grants, official election complaints submitted in accordance with RI Bylaws 13.030.1., and youth protection);
4. empowers the members of the PPC to set up processes for reviewing allegations and reports of misconduct, take any action consistent with the RI constitutional documents and Rotary Code of Policies to address such matters locally whenever possible, and make recommendations to the RI Board for further action when necessary;
5. requests the RI president to appoint six members from outside the Philippines for a minimum three-year period;
6. sets the following expectations for all members, clubs, and districts in the Philippines:
 - a. discontinue immediately sending complaints and allegations to the general secretary, members of the RI Board, and Rotary staff (other than excepted matters in point 1). All such matters are to be addressed by the PPC;
 - b. set aside personal and factional-related conflicts and help create a mediation process to address any unresolved matters within each club or district;
 - c. disband any alliances and cease any actions intended to influence or control district and zone elections;
 - d. abide by Rotary's constitutional and policy documents in all matters;
 - e. conduct all district and zone elections in accordance with Rotary policy and without disputes or election complaints;
 - f. cooperate fully with the PPC and all guidance from the RI Board and general secretary;
7. advises all members, clubs, and districts in the Philippines that failure to abide by these expectations in point 6 above may result in further remedial action by the Board, up to and including placement of clubs into nondistricted status;
8. requests the general secretary to identify disruptive individuals who repeatedly violate Rotary's policies for possible termination for good cause, and to provide an update on this matter at the June 2026 Board meeting.

91. District 6990 Issue

The general secretary reported an issue in District 6990 (Florida, USA), where the district leadership had requested that the district governor-elect, Manohar Mahajan, be removed from office, citing concerns about participation, a lack of leadership in district training events, delays in securing approval of the district budget, and maintaining a positive working relationship with district leaders. In December 2025, President Arezzo suspended the governor-elect, allowing a response period. The Board reviewed this response.

DECISION: The Board, considering all pertinent circumstances (including information submitted by Manohar Mahajan), rejects by a two-thirds vote, the nomination of Manohar Mahajan as the 2026-27 governor of District 6990 pursuant to RI Bylaws 5.040. for the reasons stated in the 24 December 2025 notice to Manohar Mahajan.

92. Rotary Club of Fredericksburg

Treasurer Eakes reported that District 7610 (Virginia, USA) has made repeated, long-term efforts to work with the Rotary Club of Fredericksburg to improve operations and ensure compliance with Rotary policy, but these efforts have been met with resistance, inaction, and ongoing complaints. As previous district interventions had been unsuccessful, Treasurer Eakes recommended that a special adviser be appointed to oversee a structured performance improvement plan that would set clear goals, timelines, resources, and accountability measures to improve leadership, inclusivity, communication with the district, public image, and overall club performance, with defined consequences if progress is not achieved.

DECISION: The Board, noting that the Rotary Club of Fredericksburg, Virginia, USA, has failed to maintain a cooperative relationship with leaders of District 7610 for many years and has at times failed to adhere to Rotary policies and procedures, implements the following actions:

1. requests the RI president to appoint a special adviser for the Rotary Club of Fredericksburg through 20 June 2027 to facilitate the club's operations aligning with Rotary's structure, culture, and values;
2. requests the special adviser to:
 - a. provide support and advice on Rotary policy and club operations;
 - b. bridge district expectations with internal club functions and leadership;
 - c. communicate with district leadership;
 - d. ensure strategic club goals are set and achieved through a performance improvement plan;
 - e. advise the Board of the club's progress or need for further action;
3. sets the following expectations for the Rotary Club of Fredericksburg:
 - a. adhere to Rotary's constitutional documents and the Rotary Code of Policies;
 - b. attend the presidents-elect learning seminar or district-approved make-up training;
 - c. create and implement a club leadership plan;
 - d. hold club board meetings on a routine schedule;
 - e. follow proper and timely membership reporting to RI;
 - f. follow RI's youth safety and protection policies and guidelines for any youth-related activities;
 - g. be a welcoming club and increase the club's gender diversity to better reflect the local community;
 - h. use Rotary's updated brand and supporting materials;
4. advises all members in the Rotary Club of Fredericksburg that failure to collaborate with the special adviser and meet the RI Board's expectations as outlined above may result in further Board action, including closure of the club for failure to function;
5. requests the general secretary to support the special adviser and monitor the club's activities and goal progress, for report to the Board at its June 2026 meeting.

93. Joint Communications Committee Report

The Joint Communications Committee met virtually on 2 December 2025 to discuss strategic initiatives, the use and implementation plans of the new simplified logo for The Rotary Foundation, efforts to improve member satisfaction through targeted content and social media campaigns, and reports from subgroups working on Rotary brand issues and Rotary magazines.

DECISION: The Board thanks the Communications Committee for its report.

94. Russian Regional Magazine

A Russian-language Rotary magazine was launched in 2016. The Board granted a provisional license to the magazine in 2018; however, a concurrent Russian district pilot program exempted members from financial obligations, preventing issuance of a full license to the magazine. After district restructuring and the end of the pilot program, the magazine ceased operations in 2022. In 2023, leadership in the District 2223 (Russian Federation) worked with Rotary to reestablish the magazine. Since 2024, the district has independently published 12 bimonthly issues and submitted all required documentation for a new provisional license. The Communications Committee reported that the magazine will require a policy exception to serve a single district and country. The district plans six digital issues and one print issue annually, funded by subscriptions and advertising. The Communications Committee has approved the district's plan and recommended that the Board grant a two-year provisional license.

DECISION: The Board grants a two-year provisional license to District 2223 to publish a Russian-language magazine.

95. Finance Committee Report

The Finance Committee met on 6 January 2026 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, USA, to discuss fiscal year 2027 budget assumptions for net investment returns, year-to-date financial results, the 2027 Rotary International Convention budget and registration schedule, district governors funding budget, and an update on the regionalization pilots in Zone 8 and in Great Britain and Ireland, among other topics.

DECISION: The Board:

1. thanks the Finance Committee for its report;
2. agrees to the 2026-27 budget assumption of 3.5% on net investment returns;
3. approves the 2026-27 district governors funding budget of US\$9,089,028 (including \$8,930,347 for district governor funding; \$51,600 for Great Britain and Ireland learning events for governor-nominee/-elect and the International Assembly; and \$107,081 for nondistricted clubs, additionally supported districts, and the Russia Federation pilot district);
4. approves the following with respect to the 2027 Dubai convention budget:
 - a. rescinds its decision 165, point (3.a.), June 2025, regarding the 2027 Rotary International Convention in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, based on successful negotiations of the venue rental discount, as follows:

3. [The Board] approves access to the convention reserve for up to US\$3 million to fund resources that are required to deliver the 2027 convention with an accelerated timeline of 24 months, as follows:

- a. ~~Board approves use of up to \$2.5 million from the convention reserve to fund any of the venue rental that cannot be covered by financial incentives and sponsorship facilitated by the HOC, while continuing to work with the HOC to identify and deliver as much financial support as possible;~~

- b. approves the 2026-27 Dubai convention budget of \$10.4 million for revenues and \$12.4 million for expenses;
- c. acknowledges up to \$2,009,000 of the budgeted expenses to be covered by the convention reserve for direct staffing allocation and other resource needs;
- d. sets the registration fee for the 2027 Dubai convention based upon 17,000 registrants with corresponding registration fees as follows:

96. Joint Audit Committee Report

The Joint Audit Committee met 10-12 November 2025 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois, USA, to discuss the Foundation’s audited financial statements; internal audit reports; updates on various organizational initiatives; 2024-25 financial statements for Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation; ongoing audit engagements, including a youth safety advisory project; and expense report analytics. The chair of the Stewardship Committee presented plans for grant fund management and stewardship activities for the upcoming fiscal year.

DECISION: The Board thank the Joint Audit Committee for its report.

APPENDIX B
GENERAL SECRETARY SUGGESTED AMENDMENTS TO THE ROTARY CODE OF POLICIES
(Decision 62)

26.060.4. Rules Regarding Campaigning, Canvassing, and Electioneering

It is a fundamental principle in Rotary that the best qualified candidate should be selected for service in Rotary's elective offices. Therefore, any effort to influence the selection process in a positive or negative manner by campaigning, canvassing, electioneering or otherwise is prohibited under the RI Bylaws.

The following rules shall be followed concerning campaigning, canvassing and electioneering for any Rotarian considering election to the office of president, director, Governor, or Council representative, or the nominating committee for any such office. These rules are designed to ensure that the best qualified candidate is selected for office:

1. Rotarians should at all times conform to the prohibitions of the RI Bylaws concerning campaigning, canvassing or electioneering. All Rotarians should observe both the letter and the spirit of the bylaws and refrain from any activity whose purpose or effect is to influence others by promoting or soliciting support for a candidate's or another Rotarian's candidacy. Such activity is repugnant to the spirit of the bylaws and the principles of Rotary and will be grounds for disqualification of a candidate.
2. Campaigning, canvassing or electioneering is any action seeking to promote, attack, support, or oppose a candidate, either directly or indirectly, in any medium, including, but not limited to, any action seeking votes, requesting support in a forthcoming election, distribution of literature or promotional materials or other overt actions intended to promote one's candidacy for an elected Rotary office. Communication seeking concurrences to a challenge resolution or election complaint within one's own club or district is permitted, provided that such contact is limited to the exchange of factual, procedural information.
3. The periods of candidacy for elective office begin when individual Rotarians begin to give serious consideration to submitting their names for a position covered by the RI rules for nominations and elections. Commencing at that time, candidates should be particularly careful to avoid any actions designed to publicize their names or achievements, to call attention to the applicable nominations or elections, or to give candidates an unfair advantage over other candidates for the same position.
4. The normal performance of duly-assigned Rotary activities would not be considered to be a violation of the policies related to campaigning, canvassing or electioneering.
5. ~~Contacting clubs to inform them to request their concurrence for a proposed challenge or election complaint is not prohibited, provided that such contact is limited to the exchange of factual information.~~

Explanation: This change reflects the requirement that a candidate secure the concurrences of a majority of clubs in two districts implemented by the 2025 COL and clarifies the type of information that can be included in communications related to the concurrence process to challenge a nominating committee's selection for RI director.

51.040. Rotary Leader

Incoming and past club and district officers, assistant governors, committee chairs, and those considering taking on a leadership role will be particularly encouraged to subscribe.

Rotary Leader will be published in eight languages – English, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese and Spanish. (June 2025 Mtg., Bd. Dec. 155)

APPENDIX G
AMENDMENTS TO THE ROTARY CODE OF POLICIES REGARDING
ANNUAL STATEMENT AND REPORT OF DISTRICT FINANCES
(Decision 88)

69.030.4. Governor Failure to Report on Finances

The annual statement as described in RI Bylaws section 15.060.4. shall include all monies received by the governor. The governor shall also send the report of the district finances to the general secretary within 12 months of the completion of the governor's year in office with proof that the report has been independently reviewed and provided to each club for discussion at a district meeting in accordance with RI Bylaws section 15.060.4.

Failure to comply with the requirement to distribute a complete financial statement to the clubs and the general secretary, and to present the statement for discussion and adoption at a district meeting within 12 months of the completion of the governor's year in office, shall result in the governor being ineligible to receive for a 7-year period:

- any additional expense reimbursements from RI
- any RI or Rotary Foundation volunteer appointment or assignment to a position with financial oversight, including but not limited to the RI director, district elected or selected roles of assistant governor, vice-governor, interim governor, COL representative, district rotary Foundation chair (DRFC), district stewardship subcommittee chair, or the district treasurer
- ~~• any Rotary Foundation appointment or assignment~~
- any RI or Rotary Foundation award

unless and until the completed financial statement is distributed to both the clubs and the general secretary and discussed and adopted at a district meeting.

In accordance with the RI Bylaws, governors must provide for the discussion and vote to adopt a previous governors' financial statement at a district meeting or conduct a club ballot. In cases where all other policy requirements have been met but there is disagreement about or interference with clubs' adoption of the annual statement, the general secretary may accept the annual statement and report of district finances. In instances where a governor fails to comply with the request from an immediate past district governor to present the annual statement and report of district finances to the clubs, the above stated consequences apply to both the past district governor and district governor on 1 July following their governor year.
